Objectives

As time goes by, traditional culture is becoming increasingly distant from contemporary daily life. However, as an embodiment of the characteristics which distinguish nations and regions from one another, it is important to ensure that traditional culture is preserved for future generations. In view of this issue, we ask: how can museums, as custodians of cultural properties, aid the transmission of traditional culture, and what role should museums play in today's society?

Based on case studies from museums the world over, this symposium will act as a forum for discussing ways of communicating traditional culture and considering its significance, as well as for exchanging related ideas and opinions.
